The slavery has a spiritual dimension but our bodies and minds and lives are also involved.</p> <p>Slaves and servants do not have rights to inheritance but children do. What inheritance do we receive from God? What difference does it</p>	<p>“The Spirit brings a sense of belonging. Do we make use of that right?</p> <p>The Spirit is working in a subtle way - almost behind the scenes. Contrast that to the Spirit’s arrival in Acts - BOOM - there it is!</p> <p>Who do you call “Abba, Father” or “Daddy”? [But let’s not say, “Who’s your daddy?”] What are that person’s characteristics? How does God fulfill the role of Daddy? Or vice versa.</p>
