People who are NATURE smart have expertise in the recognition and classification of the numerous species—the flora and fauna—in an individual's environment. This also includes sensitivity to other natural phenomena (e.g., cloud formations, mountains, etc.) and may express itself in herbal lore, folk taxonomy, hunting rituals, or animal spirit mythology. Use lots of examples from nature to engage these people in your preaching.

		1) Ultraviolet light is used as a way to purify water by killing harmful bacteria. Text: Hebrews 10:5-10

5 Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; 6 in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure. 7 Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)." 8 When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), 9 then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." 		1) vs. 5 - Christ's "first words" coming into the world - are they like a child <u>learning to speak</u> ?	
		2) Jesus is quoting Psalm 40 in verse 5. The psalmist says: " you have given me an open ear". In having this open ear, the psalmist (and Jesus) receive God's word and will and then go out and do them. It's like a see opening up its hull in order to sprout. The process is called imbibition; the seed soaks up enough water to make it swell and burst its covering. We get enough of God's word in us, we burst our protective covering and start growing!	E bring in some seeds! You can also find pictures of seeds in various states of germination. As an extra SELF or PEOPLE smart sfx, invite people to consider where they are in the process; still a seed, beginning to absorb the Word, starting to swell with it, beginning to burst your covering, setting down roots and sending up leaves, growing out of the ground, establishing roots, bearing fruit?
		3) There are some options for the verb in verse 9, including the given word "abolish" or "take up". Taking up may suit our sensitivities better; we trust that Jesus built on his own	EBring in a basket of these items and place it on the communion table. 		1) Do Mary and Elizabeth (and for that matter, John and Jesus) have an emotional symbiotic relationship? Bring in some pictures and talk about how the plover gets a nice meal from the crocodile's teeth, while the crocodile gets a nice dental cleaning from the plover. Win, win!
