From God Pause, Luther Seminary, April 13, 2016: "On a Thursday in March of 1990, we received word that my father, David Quill (Luther Seminary, '43), had suffered a massive heart attack and died almost instantly. It was spring break and we couldn't get a flight to Phoenix until Sunday morning. The whole day was a blur as we rounded up our children and told them the sad news of dad's death. Then members of the congregation I served began to arrive to express their sympathies well into the evening. When we finally got to bed I was exhausted and quickly fell asleep. About 3 a.m., I awoke to a horrible sense of grief and loss and the tears began to flow. My wife, Eileen, awoke as well and she leaned over and kissed my tears and wiped them away. So it is that when I hear the words of this reading, I do not think about them in abstract theological categories; they are moving, life-changing words that touch my memory, my heart and my soul in a very deep way.
