Text: Romans 8:6-11

6 To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. 7 For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, 8 and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

9 But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. 10 But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. 11 If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Math - Logical/Mathematical D2	Is Paul working out of the OT notion that life and death are in fact two ways of being alive (per Rob Bell in Love Wins)?	Paul shows two options for disciples to follow; setting the mind on temporal things or setting the mind on God's realm (which actually includes temporal things!) Of course, he makes the case that setting one's mind on finding what is pleasing to God is life giving. He uses the Greek word zoe which is more than biological life. Paul frequently uses rhetoric and challenges basic assumptions in his letters. By engaging his logic and fleshing it out into our own settings, you will draw in those who are oriented towards the logical intelligence. (In vs. 8 Paul makes an assumption that his audience wants to please God or that pleasing God is desirable. Hopefully church folk will agree, but this is not a good passage for apologetics, as the atheist will not agree with this premise. Natural D2		Vs. 7 - The mind set on flesh is to God as asbestos is to fire - they just don't work together. But the mind set on the Spirit is to God as wood to fire. See also Logic Using natural elements of asbestos (naturally occurring silicate! Who knew?), wood, and fire and chemical reactions as analogy may get the Naturalist's attention. The analogy may get the Logician's attention.	Bring in an asbestos pad, a block of wood, and a wee torch to demonstrate. Take all due precautions, as usual.
People - Interpersonal MWD	dwells in you	I'm thinking of the Ezekiel passage; how the Spirit responded to the words of the prophet and came to inhabit the bones and then the bodies. You can also illustrate how the spirit dwells in a people by reminding them of times when they were "caught up" in a group dynamic. (This can also have negative memories but try to emphasize positive ones.) Watching a championship game when your team wins; being at a concert; being with a group of friends at dinner; worship!	Offer a specific prayer for your congregation that calls on the Spirit to come and dwell among you. Invite your folk to think about friends or family who are hostile toward God. Do you know why? Is it because they focus on the physical world and need proof, or because of disappointment, or something else? Encourage your folk to consider these without judgment or fear, but with compassion and warmth. Offer a prayer that God's Spirit of life may be revealed in their lives.
Self - Intrapersonal D2	dwells in you		Consider the witness of your own life to those who are hostile toward God. What do you demonstrate to them about life in the Spirit that they might find desirable? Self reflection is the food of intrapersonal intelligence.

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
