People - Interpersonal D2	Vs. 3 ff - Is Jesus advocating passive-aggressive behavior or passive-aggressive behavior? Most people have experience with this form of social disruption. That seems unlikely to be what Jesus has in mind. It may be more what he thinks the scribes and Pharisees are doing in vs. 4. Can you define the difference for your people? This article from Temple U. discusses some tactics of resistance movements that are reminiscent of Jesus' tactics. The two points are Confrontation	

	and Cultural Politics. He confronted the religious establishment directly while teaching the masses how and why the establishment's teaching and practice was unworthy of loyalty and emulation. Meanwhile, this book review gives several examples of nonviolent resistance movements and their strategies. Some succeeded and some didn't, but they also bear some similarity to 1st c. Judea and Jesus' movement.
