Text: Luke 5:1-11

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, 2 he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. 3 He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. 4 When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." 5 Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." 6 When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. 7 So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. 8 But when Simon Peter saw it, including with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; 10 and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. MUSIC smart		Paul's plan for the Corinthians is like a choral composition. It begins with him singing the main theme as a solo. Next they join in, singing the melody in unison with him. Then they all break into harmony, singing the same piece, mostly the same lyrics, but in complementary lines and rhythms. He himself learned the melody from the Maestro, Christ, who had also taught it to other artists and chorus before him.	← If you have a choir director, ask for help finding examples that would illustrated this, and see if your choir could give a little demonstration. Perhaps they could use something simple like "Jesus Loves Me" or a hymn like "The Day of Resurrection." If you don't have a choir and staff, but you have enough ability, lead the congregation in the progression of solo, unison, and harmony on a well-known hymn.

MUSIC smart			Vs. 1 – Do a short hymn sing of songs of praise to God. You might prepare this ahead of time or take requests on the spot, but be sure to do the old favorites that people will want to sing and that touch their hearts. Maybe only do the first line of some of the best ones, to give everyone some earworms. Talk about how the psalmist's praises compare to those great hymns. OR Do a litany of praise on the spot. Ask people to write 3-5 words that

	express a specific reason to praise the Lord, starting with "The Lord" then something the Lord IS or something the Lord DOES. Give them just a minute or two so they don't overthink it. Then let people call out their praise one by one, and all respond with a variation of the first part of vs. 1, "I thank You, Lord, with my whole heart." Try to get everyone to do it all in iambic rhythm. Notice all the things the psalmist would include in

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. 2 Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. 3 And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." 4 The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke.

And he said: "Until cities lie waste without inhabitant, and houses without people, and the land is utterly desolate; 12 until the Lord sends everyone far away, and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land. 13 Even if a tenth part remain in it, it will be burned again, like a terebinth or an oak whose stump remains standing when it is felled." MUSIC smart		Vs. 5 – <u>Here is a collection</u> of poems about impending doom. Many people have experiences of being existentially lost and write about it. Isaiah cried out "Woe is me! I am lost!" These authors use a variety of other metaphors to express their dread, often after the fact, like the prophet. But in most of these poems the author is threatened by the Void, the powers of death and nothingness, whereas the prophet is threatened by the Holy, the Author of Life itself.	This might be a good passage to read with percussion - conga drums, maracas, castanets, triangle, shakers, etc. Use different instruments to highlight different elements of the text, like maracas for the seraphim, triangle for exalting the Lord, congas for booming voices. Get some volunteers together and work out something that conveys meaning. You should be able to come up with an arrangement in half an hour. <i>We did this at a retreat last week - yes, the one where</i>
