## **MATH Smart**

The ability to work with numbers, formulae, and logic. Mathematical/Logical people enjoy charts, graphs, statistics, and logical constructs and arguments. While we usually confine our number crunching at church to operations, budgets, and attendance figures, there are plenty of mathematical relationships in stories and parables in scripture that will preach. Relationships can be diagrammed. The logical arguments of a sermon will connected with them, too. We tend to include references to the law here (because logic) and also science and technology, which can provide plenty of SFX.

#### Text: John 12:1-8

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. 2 There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. 3 Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

4 But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 5 "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" 6 (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) 7 Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. 8 You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

For	Show the math and the chart below to establish a range of value for the nard perfume. Invite people to consider the math for their own financial situation, working out 300 days pay.  What would they think to do with a lump sum of that amount? Would it include an act of devotion to Christ?

Some history of the denarius, including its estimated worth. In terms of its silver content, it works out to about US\$2, so 300 D


would be \$600.

Denarius is a cryptocurrency, currently worth between 5¢ and 18¢ US. While this has no connection to the historical value, 300 D works out to be \$15-\$48.

MATH Smart is also about logic. This passage contrasts Mary's compassion and humble devotion to Jesus with Judas' logic about cost/benefit ratios, whatever his motivation. This is an ongoing struggle in the Church, to find the right balance between acts of mercy, devotion, and compassion and the logical assessment of distribution of limited resources. In this case there is a pretty direct statement of which is the correct answer, although it is not always so clear cut.

Also, note the logical fallacy that often follows this passage, that since "you always have the poor with you," then there is no point in sacrificial giving to help them. False! The correct

## Text: Philippians 3:4b-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. 10 want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, 11 if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

12 Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. 13 Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, 14 I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

MATH smart		Consider the things that might give us "confidence in the flesh" in our culture, that is various status symbols or stations, and assign point values to each. Car, house, job, college, resumé, awards, certificates, etc. Assign more point to the more prestigious items. Tally up. Give "knowing Christ Jesus my Lord" a lot more points than that.	← See the example below.  NB: Be pastorally sensitive to who is in your congregation, their status levels, and their reliance on status. Make clear that your point system is a reflection of cultural norms, not your pastoral norms. The point is to show how useless these status points are in the eyes of Christ.  You could also do this with the old balance scales.

MATH smart	V. 16 – Making a way in the sea is presumably the Red Sea crossing, where the army, chariots, and horses were extinguished.  V. 19 – Making a way in the wilderness as a new thing is presumably a return path from exile?	← Making a way in the sea or in the wilderness could pose some navigational headaches in the ancient world before the invention of the magnetic compass, invented by the Chinese around 2nd c. BCE, and known to be used for navigation in the Song Dynasty (960-1279 CE). Otherwise, navigation was a matter of landmarks and astronomical knowledge. This is admittedly a pretty weak connection to the text and to MATH Smart, but MATH for the science and inventive thought needed to develop	⇔ Bring in a navigation compass or display one as you talk about God's ability to make a way in uncharted places.

Another science connection would be to use a concave mirror to produce an inverted image, flipped up-down and left-right. This would be like the mirror inversion in the text of God making a dry path in the sea and rivers in the desert. If you can't lay your hands on a concave mirror (shaving or makeup mirror), you could use a double-convex lens (magnifying glass), which at the right distance will produce an inverted image.
