SELF Smart

Text: Acts 16:9-15

9 During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." 10 When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

11 We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, 12 and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. 13 On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. 14 A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. 15 When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

Do we take the time to talk and listen to God through regular prayer and silent Holy listening? If and when we sense that God is leading us in a certain direction, do we test out that direction, seeking affirmation from church, family, friends and other trusted sources?

Text: Revelation 21:10, 22-22:5

10 And in the spirit he carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God.

22 I saw <u>no temple in the city</u>, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. 23 And the city has <u>no need of sun or moon</u> to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. 24 The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. 25 Its gates will <u>never be shut</u> by day--and there will be <u>no night</u> there. 26 People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. 27 But <u>nothing unclean</u> will enter it, nor anyone who <u>practices abomination or falsehood</u>, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

22 Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb 2 through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. 3 Nothing accursed will be found there any more. SELF smart	Vs 6 - the earth has yielded its increase - "A potent antidote to fear and anger is to look at the ways in which God has blessed us."	Psalm 67 is a "good day"! The psalm itself and the linked essay ring with celebration and joy. Consider other joyful days when you celebrate (e.g. Christmas, birthdays, anniversaries, etc) - and encourage people to think of those settings as the Psalm is read. [This is a WORD and PEOPLE smart exercise but done in a SELF contained experience!]	Vs. 6 - make a list of your blessings; the things you know God has given you that have made your world bigger. Keep that list with you in your car, at work, by your bed, next to your morning mirror, on the refrigerator - any place you are likely to see it. When you are stressed or angry or not feeling well, look at the list and remember how God has blessed you already.

Text: John 5:1-9

After this there was a festival of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. 2 Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew Beth-zatha, which has five porticoes. 3 In these lay many invalids--blind, lame, and paralyzed.

Other ancient authorities add, wholly or in part, waiting for the stirring of the water; 4 for an angel of the Lord went down at certain seasons into the pool, and stirred up the water; whoever stepped in first after the stirring of the water was made well from whatever disease that person had.

5 One man was there who had been ill for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be made well?" 7 The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; and while I am making my way, someone else steps down ahead of me." 8 Jesus said to him, "Stand up, take your mat and walk." 9 At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk.
