Text: Luke 13:10-17 (NRSV)

10 Now he was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. 11 And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. 12 When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." 13 When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. 14 But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day." 15 But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? 16 And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?" 17 When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that he was doing.

PEOPLE		Public healthcare has been an issue we have struggled with in the U.S. for decades. Some think everyone should get healthcare regardless of ability to pay, but someone needs to pay for it. Some denigrate	← Invite people to discuss: What are some ways that we as a society put barriers in the way of people getting healing? Somehow this often becomes a political discussion, but work to

those who are chronically sick and those who cannot afford healthcare adequate to their needs as irresponsible. (This seems to be a near neighbor to the leader of the synagogue, who takes the odd course of blaming the sick for coming for healing on the sabbath.) See if you can give a fair representation of the different views and positions in terms of pro and con without partisanship. The point is to show that what is important to Jesus is that the woman should be healed and other questions are far less important.Here's a link to a story on facebook about a man who was bent over who was grocery shopping and a boy who helped him.	keep it from being partisan! If for no other reason than Jesus calls out those who put rules and arguments over the needs of the sick. Says so. Right here. • Invite someone to come up and stand bent over. Invite the volunteer, still holding the bent-over posture, to consider how interacting with others would be affected by this. What sort of implicit messages do we apply to someone in this posture? (<i>Possibly subservient</i> , <i>humble</i> , <i>lacking</i> <i>self-esteem</i> , <i>sad</i> , <i>etc.</i>) How might you think of others if all you could see of them was their feet? How would this affect your sense of safety in the world?
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18 You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, 19 and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. 20 (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." 21 Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") 22 But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, 23 and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, 24 and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

25 See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! 26 At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." 27 This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. 28 Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; 29 for indeed our God is a consuming fire.
