EYE Smart

Good with art and 3-dimensional space, including color, arrangement, images

In worship, project images or have pictures printed out for bulletin inserts. Make use of your physical space and "move" the story around in it. Draw attention to windows, paraments, banners, and other physical characteristics of your worship space. Allow time for mental imaging; do a guided meditation and as you preach or read Scripture, emphasize images in the story that is your base material.

Text: Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw. 2 O LORD, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? 3 Why do you make me see wrong-doing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. 4 So the law becomes slack and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the righteous—therefore judgment comes forth perverted.

Text: 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, 2 To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. 3 I am grateful to God--whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did--when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. 4 Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. 5 I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you.

6 For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; 7 for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline. 8 Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, 9 who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, 10 but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

11 For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, 12 and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. 13 Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. 14 Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

7 "Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? 8 Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? 9 Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? 10 So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!'"

| EYE | We often think of faith as something that is really big and shining, but our lived experience is that faith is tiny - sometimes so small we wonder if it even exists. Jesus uses something small to tell us that even a wee amount can do remarkable things. On the other hand, being told that something small will become large can lead to magical thinking. Is this what the disciples' request was? | Vs. 5-6 → Jack and the Beanstalk to illustrate "magical thinking" Jesus: a seed hold the potential for a tree (when it is planted and is allowed to grow). Faith (pistis) is also trust and confidence. Borrowing heavily from PEOPLE and SELF smart, think about a time when you met the person who is your best friend or your spouse.
