SELF		This is an interesting passage for stewardship season! It opens some opportunities to consider people's motivations for giving to the work of the church. Vss. 12-13 offer advice to give as we have received, although not to repay,	

because God will always out-repay us. Reverse loan shark! Vss. 14-17 point toward those who give as a way to influence God or earn God's favor, but again, God won't have it.

So imagine the internal dialogue of various folks as they work out their motivations for giving. Do it as monologue vignettes. (This bleeds over into SFX and PEOPLE, but so what?)

SELF		Vs. 16 - Amnesty International works to assure that imprisoned people have received fair due process and humane treatment. This includes opposing secret detentions, torture or mistreatment, denial of access to family, lawyers, or medical help, and detention for reasons of conscience or identity. One of their responses is letter writing campaigns on behalf of the detained (advocating for them) and to the detained (assuring them they are not forgotten).	← Invite people to imagine being alone, cut off, and abandoned as a prisoner of conscience. What fears would arise? How might it affect your sense of self-worth? What would keep you going? Then invite them to get involved in Amnesty's work or some other organization doing similar work to support isolated prisoners.

Text: Luke 18:9-14

9 He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt:

10 "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector.

11 The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. 12I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.'

13 But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' 14 I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."
